Arrive at Bay of Islands

The 'Bay of Islands' was how Cook described the area two centuries ago, and the simplicity of his name masks the diversity of its charm.

The subtleties of its attraction lie as much in the graceful fusion of sea with land as in the manoeuvres of Man - of Maori, whaler, missionary, and later, settler.

The Bay, studded with over 150 islands, is a 'drowned river system', an area where the sea has invaded and drowned a number of river valleys. Its sheltered waters offer some of the finest boating and fishing to be found anywhere, and the menus of local restaurants reflect the abundance of marine life in the Bay.

Arrive at Gisborne

Gisborne is a city on the east coast of New Zealand's North Island. It's known for wineries and surf beaches such as Makorori.

The Tairawhiti Museum has exhibits on indigenous and colonial history, with Wyllie Cottage, an early European house, and Maori artefacts.

Titirangi Reserve has lookouts and a monument to explorer James Cook.

Nearby, Te Poho-o-Rawiri is a Maori meeting house with carvings of ancestral figures.

Napier, a coastal city on New Zealand's North Island, is set amid the renowned wine-producing region of Hawke's Bay.

Rebuilt after a 1931 earthquake, the city is known for art deco landmarks like the zigzag-patterned Daily Telegraph Building.

Along the tree-lined waterfront promenade the Marine Parade, the Pania of the Reef statue depicting a Maori maiden, is a symbol of the city.

Arrive at Wellington

Wellington, the capital of New Zealand, is located at the southern tip of the North Island. Known as Windy Wellington, it is less-visited than Auckland—410 mi/660 km to the north—and it's a pity that those who do go seldom stay more than a day.


Wellington's waterfront is a true gem and a great starting point for immersing yourself in its arts and culture. It's easy to pass a day strolling the harbor's edge, ducking into museums and admiring the sculptures along the way.

Lord of The Rings fans should pay a visit to Weta Workshop and Weta Cave; tours offer behind-the-scenes insight into the making of Peter Jackson's famous films. Wellington also happens to be a base for various Middle-earth tours, although the scenery on these may not be on the same scale as their South Island counterparts.

Weather in Wellington is famously finicky, but luckily the city buzzes with outstanding bars, cafes and restaurants. Cuba Street and Courtenay Place are the main hubs of entertainment.

Akaroa is a town on the Banks Peninsula, southeast of Christchurch, New Zealand.

Akaroa Beach is on the eastern shore of Akaroa Harbor, where rare Hector's dolphins swim.

The Akaroa Museum includes 3 heritage buildings and chronicles the town's development, especially its 19th-century British and French colonial history.

The Giant's House has terraced gardens and features colorful sculptures and mosaics.

Arrive at Dunedin

Distinctly Scottish in feel with stone buildings and Victorian houses, Dunedin, New Zealand, lies on the southeast coast of the South Island about 225 mi/360 km southwest of Christchurch. This university city claims New Zealand's only castle— Larnach Castle, which overlooks Port Chalmers and the harbor. You'll also find many fine museums and galleries.

Other diversions include guided tours through the Speights Brewery, the Cadbury Chocolate factory, the 130-year-old Botanical Gardens, and the Olveston House (the original home of a wealthy merchant at the turn of the 20th century). Be sure to check out the railway station: Built in 1908 from basalt, it's one of the most photographed rail terminals in the world.

Nature lovers will enjoy the nearby Otago Peninsula, home to the magnificent southern royal albatross (viewing season is late November-late August) and shy yellow-eyed penguins (the world's second-rarest penguin species). The Little Blue Penguin is a common sight on the beaches there, usually at night.

Cruising The Fjords Of Doubtful Sound - Cruising The Fjords Of Dusky Sound - Cruising The Fjords Of Milford Sound

Fiordland National Park is a World Heritage site and includes Milford, Dusky and Doubtful Sounds. Milford Sound was described by Rudyard Kipling as the Eighth Wonder of the World.

Carved by glaciers over 100,000 years the landscape is one where waterfalls cascade hundreds of metres into deep black fiords; where ancient rainforest clings to mountains and where shimmering lakes and granite peaks look as they did a thousand years ago.

Sometimes called the 'Sound of Silence' Doubtful Sound is the deepest (421 metres) and second longest (40 kilometres) of the South Island's fiords. Like other fiords in the area, Doubtful Sound contains two distinct layers of water that don't mix.


The top few meters is fresh water, fed by runoff from the surrounding mountains. Below this is a layer of salt water from the sea. The difference in refractive index between these two layers makes it difficult for light to penetrate. As a result, many deep-sea species - such as black coral - grow in the comparatively shallow depths.

Doubtful Sound has some splendid waterfalls, particularly during the wetter seasons. Wildlife is another reason to visit this fiord where you could see bottlenose dolphins, fur seals and penguins.

Dusky Sound is longer and more extensive than other New Zealand Sounds with several arms extending inward. Sailing through the Sound, both sides of the ship have great views, although the land side has more to see. The other side is Resolution Island most of the way. It is not uncommon to have dolphins following the ships.

Burnie is a port city on the north-west coast of Tasmania. When founded in 1827, it was named Emu Bay, being renamed after William Burnie, a director of the Van Diemen's Land Company, in the early 1840s.

Burnie was proclaimed a city by Queen Elizabeth II on 26 April 1988.

Burnie is a port city with an industrial past that has reinvented itself as a vibrant and creative city on a beautiful stretch of Tasmania's north-west coast. Nestled around Emu Bay on Bass Strait, Burnie has been an industrial centre for most of its existence.







Cairns, considered the gateway to Australia's Great Barrier Reef, is a city in tropical Far North Queensland. Its Tjapukai Aboriginal Cultural Park tells the stories of indigenous Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people with music and dance.

Cairns Esplanade, lined with bars and restaurants, has a swimming lagoon. Northwest of the city, Daintree National Park spans mountainous rainforest, gorges and beaches.

Cairns is renowned as the gateway to two of the world's greatest natural attractions: the Great Barrier Reef and the Wet Tropics Rainforest. The Great Barrier Reef is the largest reef in the world measuring 2011 km in length and 72 km across at its widest point making it the world's largest World Heritage Areas.

Cooktown is justifiably famous as the site of the first white 'settlement' in Australia when Captain James Cook, having struck the Great Barrier Reef off the coast north of Cape Tribulation, struggled up the coast and beached the H.M. Barque *Endeavour* on the shores of the Endeavour River.

Cook and his crew were to stay on the river's edge from 17 June to 4 August, 1770. Today, with a sealed road from Port Douglas and Cairns, it has become a popular northern point for those not wanting to make the long, arduous and difficult journey to the top of Cape York.

It is a charming town which wears its history - lots of statues of Captain Cook and a number of impressive buildings constructed during the gold mining boom at Palmer River in the 1880s - with ease.

In recent times it has been driven by tourism and, particularly, fishing.

Arrive at Thursday Island

Thursday Island, colloquially known as TI, or in the Kawrareg dialect, Waiben or Waibene, is an island of the Torres Strait Islands, an archipelago of at least 274 small islands in the Torres Strait. TI is located approximately 39 kilometres north of Cape York Peninsula in Far North Queensland, Australia.

Thursday Island is the administrative and main population centre of the Torres Strait Islands. It has developed visitor facilities, with supermarkets, a few accommodation options, a restaurant or two, souvenirs, and decent espresso.

The locals are friendly towards visitors, but you won't find city style service or resorts. TI offers a cold beer on the pub deck overlooking aquamarine waters and islands, and an opportunity for genuine interaction with Torres Strait Island peoples - as well as those other Australians and passers through now well adapted to the remote existence it offers.

Throw in a bit of history (the island was evacuated to be a military base during World War II, and was a pearling centre before that) and unrivaled fishing, and you have TI in a nutshell.

Darwin is the capital of Australia's Northern Territory and a former frontier outpost. It's also a gateway to massive Kakadu National Park. Its popular waterfront area has several beaches and green areas like Bicentennial Park. Also near the water is the Museum and Art Gallery of the Northern Territory, displaying Southeast Asian and Pacific art, plus a pearling lugger and other seafaring vessels.

Darwin is one of Australia's thriving business capitals. In business and industry circles, Darwin is described as Australia's gateway to South East Asia. It's closer to the Indonesian capital of Jakarta than it is to Canberra and is about the same flying time from Singapore and Manila as it is from Sydney and Melbourne.

As well as markets, crocodiles and cruises, you'll find strong Aboriginal cultures here as evidenced by the array of languages spoken in the streets and the vibrant Aboriginal art that fills the city's galleries and museums.

The city's proximity to Asia means you'll also find strong Asian influences, especially in the energetic food scene and night markets.

Komodo island, part of the Lesser Sunda chain of Indonesian islands, is particularly notable as the habitat of the Komodo dragon, the largest lizard on Earth, which is named after the island.

Komodo National Park covers the entire region and is home to more than 4,000 dragons. It is made up of rusty-red volcanic hills, savannah and forests.

Its surrounding waters of seagrass beds, mangrove shrub lands and coral reefs are famous for diving.
